
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ODFW Corner

Conventional Class: This class gives a thorough introduction to the skills hunters need, covering topics like: firearms safety, hunter ethics, wildlife identification, hunt preparation and techniques, and outdoor survival. All youth students are required to participate in a live-fire exercise.

Field Day: Students must complete an online course or workbook and bring the online course completion certificate or completed workbook to this ODFW Field Day. Field day instruction includes a review of course topics, Oregon hunting regulations, ethics, conservation, firearm safety field exercises, a live-fire exercise and a 60 question written final exam.

16 year-old S3DA archer Alli D.'s father recounts her successful elk hunt this year:

We saw two different herds a long ways off. No good bulls in either heard. Then we headed to another spot that I wanted to check out. Spotted a cow

on the road and she walked off into the replanted trees. It looked pretty thick but we headed in to have a look see. Headed in about 40 yards and let out a couple cow calls followed a small bugle. Instantly he fired back with his own bugle. I cut him off with one of my own bugles and that pissed him off. He was headed in. We could hear him breathing as he close the distance. We were standing on a huge old growth log to see a little better. Alli had a lighted nock on her gold tip arrow ready to fly out of her Athens Summit. You could see the trees moving as he closed the distance. I told Alli to be ready. He came out 8 yards and broadside. I let out a soft cow call and he hit the brakes. It seemed like forever to me for her to shoot. As the arrow took flight and the lighted nock lit up I knew it was a good hit. He spun and took off. I then started cow calling and he stopped just out of sight. As we start tracking I found about 4 inches of the arrow and confirmed what we already knew. After following it about 40 yards we found her bull. Here are some pics of her evening. Long night but worth every minute of it. (James D.)



Wild Hart Outdoors recounts Marshall's successful archery hunt that they were able to mentor this year:

You guys! If you want a truly rewarding experience, take a kid hunting! I've been fortunate to be part of Marshall's archery journey from the beginning.

He doesn't come from a 'hunting' family, so he needed help and we were happy to do it. Last year he decided he wanted to hunt turkey with a bow. We said okay, we will take you turkey hunting, but you have to be able to shoot a tight group of arrows because they have a small kill zone. This kid worked hard at it for months and by turkey season he was ready. One hour into his first hunt he made a perfect shot on a beautiful tom. This year he wanted to go deer hunting. We set up a blind and had some nice little bucks coming in. Last night, our first night in the blind, the buck he wanted walked in with two others at last light. He made a perfect double lung-er on this beautiful black tail. The deer went less than a hundred yards and fell over. We can NOT describe in words the pure joy it gives us to mentor a kid who is passionate about the outdoors. To watch him grow and to be able to help him along the way. What a blessing. We are so proud of him! Now he wants an elk.

 tournament will be a pre-requisite to participate in the state
 tournament.

Academic Archer

NASP® Academic Archer is open to ALL participating NASP® students – tournament participation is not necessary!

Last year, Oregon had 91 students nominated as Academic Archers. This year, our goal is 200! The archers that are nominated are entered for a chance to WIN A FREE GENESIS BOW. In 2019, one of Oregon's Academic Archers was the recipient of a Genesis Bow!

The program was established to promote and recognize academic excellence among student archers. Each student that is registered into https://nasptournaments.org as an Academic Archer, will be automatically registered for a chance to win 1 of 10 free Genesis bows and specially marked Easton arrows – given away each year by NASP. Names of winners

will be announced prior to the national NASP® tournament. Together, let us recognize student success both on and off the range.

To qualify:

- The student should be/have been a full participant in their school's "in-school" NASP® archery class
 - a. And/or be members of the school archery team
- 2. The student should have no D's or F's (or equivalent)
- The student should maintain a grade point average that establishes them well within existing school GPA criteria for high academic scholarship
- 4. When no school academic recognition criteria exists, the NASP® coach should contact and collaborate with the school principal to establish such criteria before designating students as academic archers

To designate students:

- 1. Log into https://nasptournaments.org
- 2. Click the "School" drop down menu
 - a. Select "school manager"
 - b. If your school does not appear, click on the "search for a school" button to associate your account with your school
- 3. Go to the "Archers" section and find the archer you wish to designate
 - a. If the archer is no on the list, click "Add Archer"
 - b. If the archer is on the list, click the orange "Action" button and click "view/edit"
- 4. On the archer edit screen, click the check for "academic archer" box

Asked & Answered

Q: Running an archery club has more fees associated with it than I thought, what are some ideas on how to fundraise to cover these fees?

A: Try to be as creative as possible, donors like to see new ideas/events. Here are some fundraising ideas:

Reminder, you are responsible for researching what is required to hold any fundraising event for your club. [Charitable gaming regulated by the Oregon Department of Justice (DOJ) consists of bingo, raffle and Monte Carlo events in which the proceeds are used to fund the activities of tax-exempt nonprofit organizations.]

- 1. Broken Arrow Pens: If you have carbon or aluminum arrows that can no longer be used (ones that still have all of their vanes) take the arrows to somewhere that has an arrow saw, like an archery pro shop, and cut them down to about 8 inches. Take a pen ink insert and slide inside of the arrow, add the tip over the insert and glue to arrow shaft. Make sure to get inserts that have the pen tip!
- 2. Shoot-a-thon: Have the archers solicit sponsors who will donate a set amount for each arrow shot in a specified time period. An example of

- this would be someone will donate a dollar for every arrow shot by their archer during a 24 hour event. If the archer shoots 100 arrows during those 24 hours, they receive \$100.
- 3. Archery Tournament: Host an indoor, 3D, or outdoor tournament. Talk with local businesses to see about getting door prizes donated, and have awards for top finishers. Charge enough of a fee to cover awards and any other costs, and a couple dollars extra to go to the club. Stephanie has a basic "how-to" document if you are interested.
- 4. Intro to archery class: Consider asking a range to donate their targets/space to run this, and using those who are fundraising as assistant coaches. Make sure to have enough certified coaches on hand. This also builds awareness of your group.
- 5. Archery Station: Have a station set up at a large event were a person can pay for a set number of arrows (ex. \$1 for 5 arrows). This can also be done with the archery disc thrower. Make sure that the range is set up safe, and you may need to provide basic instruction. This also builds awareness of your group.
- 6. Sponsors: Offer sponsorship opportunities to local business and local group charter (OHA, Mule Deer Foundation, etc.) in exchange for ad space at the range or on a shirt.
- 7. Raffle: Buy or have someone donate an item to raffle off. Note think of something that a lot of people will want and who you will try to sell tickets/cards/coupons to. In some cases, you may want to consider non-archery related items. Visit doj.state.or.us/charitable-activities/charitable-gaming/charitable-gaming-faqs/ for more information about how to hold a raffle in Oregon.
- 8. Bingo: Visit doj.state.or.us/charitable-activities/charitable-gaming/charitable-gaming-faqs/ for more information about how to charge for Bingo games in Oregon.

- Car wash: Ask a local business to donate their location and water access/supply for the event. Supplies needed include: Sponges or car wash gloves, long handled car wash brush, hose, car wash soap, and towels.
- 10. Can and bottle drive: Visit https://www.obrc.com/Fundraising for more information on can and bottle drives in Oregon.
- 11. Business takeover: Talk with local businesses and see if they will allow you to "run the place" for a day or if they are willing to donate a portion of the profits from any sales your group brings in. Examples of this include movie theaters, restaurants, pools, bowling alleys, and arcades.
- 12. Grocery store registers: Talk with your local grocery store to see if they have the option to "round up to give back" at the register.
- 13. Trivia night: Host a trivia night at a local business, they donate the location in exchange for you bringing people in, charge an entrance fee and have a prize for the winning team. An idea for a prize could be an item or gift certificate to the host location. Think of some archery related questions!

In response to Asked & Answered September, 2019

So, I have an interesting response from my team about enough practice time. The first couple years we had no room on campus in either of our 2 gyms because of the basketball schedule for school, and the rec leagues that use the gym. Even on the weekends. We practiced at Sportsman's Warehouse, who graciously supported our team as it grew by allowing us in their small, almost 10 meter alley. I had 30 minute time slots and rotated 4 students through those 30 minute slots Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 4:00-7:30pm. But we lacked 15 meter practice.
