



SPORT GROUNDFISH

What can I keep and how many?

Effective as of **September 18, 2025**.
Regulations can change in the middle of the season, so be sure to check myodfw.com/fishing/marine-zone for the most up-to-date regulations and bag limits before you go fishing.



Any vessel fishing for or possessing bottomfish, Pacific halibut, or flatfish in the ocean must have a functional descending device onboard, regardless of depth. You are required to use it on any rockfish released outside (seaward) of the 30-fathom regulatory line.



GENERAL MARINE SPECIES

Open to all depths year round

4-fish daily bag limit August 18 - September 17

3-fish daily bag limit beginning September 18

Min. size = 16 inches
Opens July 1, 2025

*Out of the 3-fish daily bag limit, no more than 1 may be cabezon (when open) and no more than 1 may be a canary rockfish

- Includes all rockfish, sculpins, greenlings, skates, spiny dogfish, leopard shark, soupfin shark, Pacific cod, cabezon, and any other marine fish species not listed on page 81 of the 2025 Oregon Sport Fishing Regulations book.
- Does not include species with separate limits such as: lingcod, **sablefish**, flatfish, tuna and other offshore pelagic species, salmon, Pacific halibut, surfperch, herring, sardines, and anchovies.
- Anglers may keep one general marine fish daily bag limit of up to 3 fish on a bottomfish trip and do a separate offshore long-leader trip on the same day, but fish must be offloaded in between trips and may total no more than 10 general marine species per day.

SPORT GROUNDFISH

What can I keep and how many?

FLATFISH

Open to all depths year round

California Halibut

- DOES NOT include Pacific halibut. See Pacific halibut regulations before fishing for halibut.
- Includes all other flatfish species (flounders, soles, sanddabs, and turbot).
- Skates and rays are NOT part of the flatfish group.



OFFSHORE LONG-LEADER

Only open outside (seaward) of the 40-fathom regulatory line and using long-leader gear

- Only species allowed include the following rockfish: yellowtail, widow, canary, blue, deacon, bocaccio, chilipepper, redstripe, greenstriped, and silvergray.
- For a **10-fish** bag limit to apply, **fishing must occur outside (seaward) of the 40-fathom regulatory line and with long-leader gear**.
- No other rockfish or lingcod may be kept. For more info on what can be combined on the same trip, see myodfw.com/sport-bottomfish-seasons
- Anglers may keep one general marine fish daily bag limit of up to **3** fish on a bottomfish trip and do a separate offshore long-leader trip on the same day, but fish must be offloaded in between trips and may total no more than 10 general marine species per day.
- Natural bait is prohibited.

*Out of the **10-fish** bag limit, **no more than 1** may be a canary rockfish
