Ken reported that while the budget will remain open through December 2025 for final adjustments, this is the final financial report for the period as the agency transitions to the new biennium. As of July 30, 2025, the department held a total of \$169.0 million in the State Treasury-\$79.7 million in unrestricted cash (including over \$20 million in insurance funding for wildfire damage) and \$89.3 million in restricted cash, with the unrestricted balance increasing by \$6 million due to strong license sales and federal reimbursements; it also includes \$20 million in wildfire insurance funds. Expenditures are tracking as expected at 73.25% of the approved budget and will

1	increase slightly as final adjustments occur. Revenues are also on track, with 2025 license sales 3%
2	higher than 2024 and expected to remain strong through October. The 2025–2027 budget is
3	finalized and in the execution phase, with auditing and program allocation work underway, and
4	development for the 2027–2029 budget will begin this winter.

## 1 **EXHIBIT C: 2026-27 SPORT FISHING REGULATIONS, OCEAN ENDORSEMENT, AND COQUILLE RIVER** 2 HATCHERY FALL CHINOOK 3 The Commission adopted administrative rules to set the 2026-27 Recreational Sport Fishing 4 Regulations, the Ocean Endorsement, and set a season for hatchery Chinook salmon in the Coquille 5 River. 6 Commission Action: Rulemaking 7 Michele Weaver, Acting Recreational Fisheries Manage 8 9 Presentation: Michele provided the Commission with a presentation outlining the proposed 10 administrative rule changes for the 2026–2027 recreational sport fishing regulations and Ocean 11 Endorsement. The focus is on maintaining stable fisheries, simplifying regulations, addressing 12 conservation needs, and improving public engagement. Key proposals include allowing spearfishing for bass and walleye in certain waters, increasing the kokanee bag limit statewide, and updating 13 14 zone-specific rules such as closing parts of the John Day River to salmon and steelhead fishing and 15 removing limits on lake trout in Wallowa Lake. 16	removing some western hunts and adding new eastern ones to align with management goals. The
17	presentation emphasizes data-driven decisions, public engagement, and adaptive strategies to
18	ensure long-term wildlife health and hunting opportunities.
