MEETING

On Friday, **September 12, 2025 at 8:00 AM**, Chair Wahl called the **Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission** (the Commission) meeting to order.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Financial Report
Ken Loffink, Chief Operating Officer

Ken reported that while the budget will remain open through December 2025 for final adjustments, this is the final financial report for the period as the agency transitions to the new biennium. As of July 30, 2025, the department held a total of \$169.0 million in the State Treasury- \$79.7 million in unrestricted cash (including over \$20 million in insurance funding for wildfire damage) and \$89.3 million in restricted cash, with the unrestricted balance increasing by \$6 million due to strong license sales and federal reimbursements; it also includes \$20 million in wildfire insurance funds. Expenditures are tracking as expected at 73.25% of the approved budget and will

increase slightly as final adjustments occur. Revenues are also on track, with 2025 license sales 3% higher than 2024 and expected to remain strong through October. The 2025–2027 budget is finalized and in the execution phase, with auditing and program allocation work underway, and development for the 2027–2029 budget will begin this winter.

ADOPT TEMPORARY RULES

Debbie Colbert, Director, requested the Commission ratify the following temporary rules. The eight (8) temporary rules were previously adopted by the director under her emergency action authority.

1.) 635-06-0510

Hatchery Chinook Bonus Bag Limit in the Coos River Basin

Adopted: 8/18/2025 Effective Dates: 8/19/2025 through 12/31/2025

This amended rule will add an additional salmon to the bag limit in the Coos Basin.

2.) 635-016-0050

Closure of Umpqua River Basin to Chinook Salmon Angling

Adopted: 8/18/2025 Effective Dates: 8/19/2025 through 11/30/2025

This amended rule closes angling for and retention of all Chinook.

3.) 635-016-0510

Hatchery Chinook Bonus Bag Limit in the Coos River Basin

Adopted: 8/20/2025 Effective Dates: 8/20/2025 through 12/31/2025

This amended rule will add an additional salmon to the bag limit in the Coos Basin.

4.) 635-042-0032

Set Columbia River Non-Treaty Late Fall Commercial Tangle Net Salmon Fishery

Adopted: 8/22/2025 Effective Dates: 9/16/2025 through 12/31/2025

This rule authorizes 34 late fall non-treaty commercial tangle net fishing periods in Zones 1-3 of the lower Columbia River.

5.) 635-016-0500

Closure of Umpqua River Basin to Chinook Salmon Angling and Retention

Adopted: 8/18/2025 Effective Dates: 8/19/2025 through 11/30/2025

This amended rule closes angling for and retention of all salmon species in the Mainstem Umpqua, Smith, and North Fork Smith rivers in all waters.

6.) 635-016-0500

(Corrected) Closure of Umpqua River Basin to Chinook Salmon Angling and Retention

Adopted: 8/18/2025 Effective Dates: 8/25/2025 through 11/30/2025

This amended rule closes angling for and retention of all salmon species in the Mainstem Umpqua, Smith, and North Fork Smith rivers in all waters.

7.) 635-041-0075

Authorize sales of fish caught in the Columbia River Zone 6 Treaty commercial gillnet fisheries to state-licensed buyers.

Adopted: M/D/2025 Effective Dates: 9/8/2025 through 12/31/2025

These amended rules authorize the sales of fish caught in Zone 6 treaty commercial gillnet fisheries. Open fishing periods are from September 8 through September 13, and September 15 through September 19.

8.) 635-042-0060

Set mainstem Columbia River late fall commercial gillnet fishery

Adopted: 9/5/2025 Effective Dates: 9/7/2025 through 12/31/2025

This rule authorizes one commercial non-treaty gillnet fishing period in the mainstem Columbia River commercial Zones 4-5 for September 7 through September 8.

9 **EXHIBIT B: 2025 GREATER SAGE-GROUSE CONSERVATION ASSESSMENT AND STRATEGY FOR**
10 **OREGON**

11 The Commission approved updated to the “Greater Sage-Grouse Conservation Assessment
12 and Strategy for Oregon” and amend associated rules.

17 *Presentation:* Mikal and Skyler provided the Commission with a presentation outlining the major
18 updates to the state's approach for conserving greater sage-grouse populations. Including a revised
19 population model and updated habitat maps and emphasizes a tiered strategy aligned with the
20 Oregon Sage-grouse Action Plan and federal BLM plans. Key updates include new definitions for leks
21 (breeding sites), habitat objectives requiring at least 70% sagebrush coverage in priority areas, and a
22 focus on threat-based conservation. The strategy promotes coordinated efforts across agencies and
23 landowners, with goals to maintain or enhance sage-grouse populations around the 2003 baseline
24 (~53,000 birds) and ensure stable or increasing trends at both state and local (PAC) levels. The plan
25 also recommends regulatory amendments and outlines ODFW’s responsibilities in monitoring,
26 mitigation, and collaborative management.

EXHIBIT C: 2026-27 SPORT FISHING REGULATIONS, OCEAN ENDORSEMENT, AND COQUILLE RIVER HATCHERY FALL CHINOOK

The Commission adopted administrative rules to set the 2026-27 Recreational Sport Fishing Regulations, the Ocean Endorsement, and set a season for hatchery Chinook salmon in the Coquille River.

Commission Action: Rulemaking

Michele Weaver, Acting Recreational Fisheries Manager

Presentation: Michele provided the Commission with a presentation outlining the proposed administrative rule changes for the 2026–2027 recreational sport fishing regulations and Ocean Endorsement. The focus is on maintaining stable fisheries, simplifying regulations, addressing conservation needs, and improving public engagement. Key proposals include allowing spearfishing for bass and walleye in certain waters, increasing the kokanee bag limit statewide, and updating zone-specific rules such as closing parts of the John Day River to salmon and steelhead fishing and removing limits on lake trout in Wallowa Lake. The presentation also emphasizes climate change considerations, tribal coordination, and targeted outreach efforts to ensure inclusive public input.

Issue 1:

Commissioner Labhart moved to amend the Sport Fishing Regulations as proposed by staff in attachment 3a, and in addition as proposed by staff in attachment 4 except that with respect to Proposal Number 59: Proposed Regulation Open for hatchery steelhead Aug 1 - Dec 31- that the date of August 1 is changed to November 1. I also authorize staff to update the necessary calendar dates and make formatting changes to correct spelling and grammar errors, and to address inadvertent inconsistencies to improve readability. EXHIBIT D: 2026 BIG GAME SEASONS AND REGULATIONS

1 The Commission adopted administrative rules for 2026 big game and western gray squirrel season
2 dates, open areas, dates and locations of travel management areas, and 2026 Oregon big game
3 season-controlled hunt tag numbers.

9 Presentation: Staff provided the Commission with a presentation outlining proposed updates to
10 hunting regulations based on biological data, population surveys, and public input. Key highlights
11 include maintaining sustainable harvest frameworks, managing wildlife populations through habitat
12 restoration and conflict mitigation, and adjusting hunting opportunities. Cougar and black bear
13 populations are stable or increasing, with proposals to maintain current season structures while
14 protecting young and females with offspring. For ungulates, bighorn sheep and mountain goat
15 populations are stable or growing, prompting minor tag adjustments. Elk proposals include
16 removing some western hunts and adding new eastern ones to align with management goals. The
17 presentation emphasizes data-driven decisions, public engagement, and adaptive strategies to
18 ensure long-term wildlife health and hunting opportunities.

36 *Presentation:* Reva provided the Commission with a presentation outlining the grant
37 recommendations for the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's (ODFW) 2025 review of the
38 Oregon Conservation & Recreation Fund (OCRf), recommending funding for 19 projects totaling
39 about \$1.04 million. The projects include 13 focused on drought resilience and six on non-drought
40 issues. Highlighted items include efforts such as "Trail Champions 2026," "Monitoring the Drought
41 Resilience of Wetlands and Amphibians," "Fishing and Shell fishing with Oregon's Physical Disability

Community,” and “From River to Action: Empowering Underserved Leaders to Implement Conservation Plans in Malheur County.” The staff recommendation seeks Commission approval for all 19 projects and the associated funding.

Additionally, two board appointments are recommended: re-appointment of Nic Callero as the Hunter Representative and appointment of John Dehler III as Landowner Representative on the Access & Habitat Board.
