Ken reported that for the month ending November 30, 2025; the department held a total of \$163.4 million in state treasury, \$73.8 million in unrestricted cash (approximately \$54.8 million excluding \$19 million in wildfire insurance proceeds) and \$89.6 million in restricted funds. At roughly 20% through the 2025–27 biennium, agency expenditures amount to 15% of the approved budget, indicating spending is tracking slightly below expectations. In response to projected General and Lottery Fund shortfalls, the department submitted options to reduce 5% of its allocations, with decisions pending during the February–March 2026 legislative session following the state’s next revenue forecast. Additionally, initial planning for the 2027–29

1 biennium budget has begun, including policy option submissions, revenue/expenditure
2 projections, upcoming stakeholder outreach, and anticipated guidance from the Legislative Fiscal
3 Office and DAS Chief Financial Officer ahead of the June 2026 Commission meeting

21 seven (7) temporary rules were previously adopted by the director under her emergency action
22 authority.

23 1.) **635-005-0465**

24 **2025-2026 Commercial Dungeness Crab Season Opening North of Cape Falcon**

25 Adopted 12/19/2025: effective 12/19/2025 through 3/31/2026

26 This amended rule sets the opening date for the Oregon 2025-2026 ocean commercial
27 Dungeness crab fishery from Cape Falcon to the Oregon-Washington border.

30 **Modify Season Structure and Allow Sales of Sturgeon Caught in Columbia River Treaty**
31 **Setline Fisheries**

32 Adopted 12/23/2025: effective 1/1/2026 through 1/31/2026

33 This amended rule modifies the season structure in permanent rule for the treaty sturgeon
34 setline fishery and provides state authorization of sales of white sturgeon caught in the
35 winter Treaty setline fisheries in Bonneville Pool, The Dalles Pool, and The John Day Pool
36 to reflect recent tribal action to modify these fisheries.

38 3.) **635-023-0101**

39 **Modify Recreational Retention Fishery for Sturgeon in John Day Pool and Adjacent**
40 **Tributaries**

41 Adopted 12/23/2025: effective 1/1/2026 through 4/30/2026

42 This amended rule modifies the recreational retention fishery regulations for white
43 sturgeon in the John Day Pool (John Day Dam upstream to McNary Dam) of the mainstem
44 Columbia River and all adjacent tributaries. Retention will be allowed in the John Day Pool
45 from January 1 through April 30, 2026. Modifications are consistent with actions taken by

1 the Departments of Fish & Wildlife for the States of Oregon and Washington at a Columbia
2 River Joint State hearing on November 13, 2025

3
4 4.) **635-023-0101**

5 **Close Retention of Sturgeon in Recreational Fisheries in the John Day Pool and Adjacent**
6 **Tributaries**

7 Adopted 1/9/2026: effective 1/10/2026 through 4/30/2026

8 This amended rule closes the retention season for white sturgeon on the mainstem
9 Columbia River in the John Day Pool (John Day Dam upstream to McNary Dam) and all
10 adjacent tributaries.

11 Modifications are consistent with actions taken by the Departments of Fish & Wildlife for the
12 States of Oregon and Washington at a Columbia River Joint State hearing on January 8, 2026.

13
14 5.) **635-042-0130**

15 **Adopt Non-Treaty Columbia River Mainstem Commercial Smelt Fishery**

16 Adopted 1/9/2026: effective 1/12/2026 through 3/19/2026

17 This amended rule will implement the 2026 non-treaty commercial smelt fishery in Zones
18 1-3 of the lower Columbia River on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 5 a.m. to
19 5 p.m. from January 12 through February 19, 2026, and from 5 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Mondays
20 and Thursdays from February 23 through March 19, 2026. Modifications are consistent
21 with actions taken by the Departments of Fish and Wildlife for the States of Oregon and
22 Washington at the Columbia River Compact hearing held on January 8, 2026.

23
24 6.) **635-016-0510**

25 **Allow Bait on the Coquille River and Tributaries**

26 Adopted 1/12/2026: effective 1/12/2026 through 7/10/2026

27 This rule will correct language that inadvertently removed the allowance of bait in the
28 Coquille River basin from January 1st through May 31st and November 1st through
29 December 31st.

32 **Amend Rules to Reduce 2026 Oregon Hunting Tags for Rocky Mountain Goats**

33 Adopted: 01/12/2026: effective date: 01/12/2026 through 07/10/2026

34 Oregon Administrative Rules establishing tag numbers for 2026 Rocky Mountain goat hunts
35 were adopted by the Fish and Wildlife Commission on September 12, 2025, meeting. Tag
36 numbers adopted at that time did not account for low number of Rocky Mountain goats
37 observed in the Snake River Wildlife Management Unit during the most recent population
38 surveys.

27 **Exhibit A: COMMISSION MINUTES**

28 Action:

29 Commissioner Labhart moved to approve December 16, 2025, meeting minutes with
30 continued authority to correct grammar and punctuation. Commissioner Hall Defrees seconded
31 the motion, and the motion carried seven (7) in favor; Wahl, Hatfield-Hyde; Labhart, Spelbrink,
32 Hall Defrees, Morrison, Moldal

34 **EXHIBIT B: UPDATING CEREMONIAL AND SUBSISTENCE HUNTING TAG NUMBERS FOR**
35 **BURNS PAIUTE TRIBE**

36 The Commission updated the number of hunting tags available to the Burns Paiute Tribe to
37 support their member's interests in ceremonial and subsistence hunting opportunities. The
38 amendments also aligned the rules to recently adopted mule deer hunt areas and slightly
39 expand the geographic scope of those opportunities.

40 *Commission Action: Rulemaking*

42 *Tracy Kennedy, Chairperson of Tribal Council, Burns Paiute Tribe*

44 *Presentation:* Phil and Chairman Kennedy provided the Commission with a presentation
45 outlining updates to hunting opportunities for the Burns Paiute Tribe, emphasizing the evolution

1 of ceremonial tags since 2017, including increases in elk tags and expanded access through
2 agreements like the 2022 Memorandum of Agreement with Malheur National Wildlife Refuge.
3 The proposed changes aim to update ceremonial and subsistence tags by transitioning mule
4 deer hunt areas from WMU to DHA, modifying elk and pronghorn hunt areas, increasing tag
5 allocations (16 for mule deer and 30 for elk), and formally recognizing subsistence hunting as a
6 purpose. The motion recommends adopting amendments to OAR 635-800-0015 to implement
7 these updates.

14 Commissioner Morrison moved to adopt amendments to OAR 635-800-0015 as proposed by staff
15 in Attachment 3. Commissioner Moldal seconded the motion, and the motion was carried seven
16 (7) in favor; Wahl, Hatfield-Hyde; Labhart, Spelbrink, Hall Defrees, Morrison, Moldal

18 **EXHIBIT C: LANDOWNER PREFERENCE PROGRAM FORMULA FOR SETTING MULE DEER**
19 **TAGS**

20 The Commission amended rules to modify the formula for setting landowner preference
21 program tags for mule deer hunts and to modify the names of some mule deer herd ranges.

22 *Commission Action: Rulemaking*

23 Brian Wolfer, Deputy Administrator Wildlife Division
24 Lee Foster, District Wildlife Biologist.

25
26 Presentation: Brian and Lee provided the Commission with a presentation outlining the
27 Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife’s Landowner Preference (LOP) program for mule deer
28 tags, which provides controlled hunt tags to landowners for use on their property. Originally
29 established in 1981, the program evolved through legislative changes, including a 2013
30 requirement to limit tags when populations fall below management goals. The current formula
31 uses a three-tier system based on population levels relative to management objectives, but a
32 proposed revision simplifies this to two tiers: Tier 1 for moderate or low concern areas (or >75%
33 private land) with tags allocated by acreage, and Tier 2 for high-concern areas with limits of 15%
34 of controlled tags or five tags. The changes aim to align with the 2024 Mule Deer Plan, provide
35 stability for landowners, and slightly increase antlerless LOP tags. Implementation begins for
36 2026 hunts, with evaluation after two to three years, alongside herd range name changes for
37 clarity and consistency with regulations.

7 **EXHIBIT D: COQUILLE RIVER FALL CHINOOK CONSERVATION HATCHERY PROGRAM**
8 **MODIFICATION**

9 The Commission approved a modification to the Coquille River conservation hatchery
10 program.

11 *Commission Action: Approval*

12 Greg Huchko, Umpqua Watershed District Manager
13 John Ogan, Coquille Indian Tribe

15 Presentation: Greg and John provided the Commission with a presentation outlining the
16 Coquille River Fall Chinook Conservation Hatchery Program, which was initiated in 2022 to
17 prevent extirpation, conserve genetic diversity, and increase abundance of fall Chinook salmon.
18 They reviewed limiting factors such as invasive bass species and warming trends, and
19 management actions including habitat restoration, harvest restrictions, and hatchery efforts. The
20 conservation program uses wild broodstock and releases marked smolts to the upper basin but
21 faces challenges due to low wild fish returns and difficulty meeting abundance goals. To address
22 this, the recommendation was to allow incorporation of hatchery-origin broodstock, supported
23 by genetic analysis showing no population differentiation from wild fish, while continuing to use
24 wild brood when available. This adaptive approach aligns with existing policies and conservation
25 plans.
