



AGENDA ITEM SUMMARY

BACKGROUND

The Oregon Conservation and Recreation Fund (OCRF) was created in 2019 within the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (Department) as a way for Oregonians to support a broad range of conservation and outdoor recreation efforts throughout the state. The intent of the OCRF is to increase the Department's capacity to protect and enhance the species and habitats identified in the State Wildlife Action Plan (SWAP; formerly known as the Oregon Conservation Strategy) and create new opportunities for wildlife watching, urban conservation, community science, and other wildlife-associated recreation.

Expenditures from the OCRF are recommended to the Commission by the Oregon Conservation and Recreation Advisory Committee (Advisory Committee). Since the formation of the OCRF, 204 projects have been funded through nine rounds of competitive requests for proposals (RFP). These projects have spanned the state and have provided needed funds to ODFW partners promoting science focused conservation and research as well as outdoor equity and access.

The Advisory Committee seeks to make multiple, diverse expenditures in each funding round encompassing diverse geography, taxonomy, representation of program priorities, and partner engagement.

The Advisory Committee released their tenth RFP to the public in December 2025, offering \$400,000 to projects implementing the SWAP and/or addressing outdoor equity.

The Advisory Committee is seeking the Commission's approval for the expenditure of \$436,297 from the OCRF main account to fund 19 projects selected from the Winter 2025 OCRF RFP cycle (see Commission Attachment 2, 'Projects Selected for Funding').

PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT

The Conservation and Recreation Advisory Committee meetings are noticed and open to public participation and have time on the agenda for comments from participating members of the public. The opportunity to apply for funds was well publicized through a press release, multiple emails, and amplification through our partners' communication networks.

Additionally, the public has an opportunity to provide comment prior to (in writing) or (orally) during the hearing that occurs at the Commission meeting.

ISSUE

Oregon Conservation & Recreation Fund Expenditure Recommendations from currently available funds.

ANALYSIS

A summary of the Advisory Committee's process is provided below, and the recommendations are provided in Attachment 2.

The Advisory Committee released their RFP to the public in December 2025 offering funding to projects that address a broad range of conservation and outdoor recreation efforts addressing outdoor equity and/or related priorities from the Oregon SWAP.

The OCRF RFP closed in February 2026 with 90 applications (see Commission Attachment 3 'Submitted Projects Overview').

Each project proposal was reviewed by content experts from ODFW staff and then scored by at least two Advisory Committee members using established criteria as defined in Commission Attachment 4 'Project Scoring Criteria'.

The Advisory Committee met on May 5, 2026 to discuss project reviews and select projects based on overall rankings and the desired diversity of project types and geographies. The Advisory Committee voted and recommended 19 projects for funding for a total expenditure of \$436,297 from the OCRF (see Commission Attachment 2 'Projects Selected for Funding').

The projects selected for funding will benefit SWAP species of greatest conservation need such as native eelgrass, gray whale, Olympia oysters, Lewis's woodpecker, western bumble bee, common nighthawk, northwestern pond turtle, coho and chinook salmon, Mazama newt, and Pacific brook lamprey, and will benefit key habitats from the SWAP such as estuaries, wetlands, coastal dunes, ponderosa pine woodlands, mixed conifer forests, and flowing water and riparian habitats. By supporting these projects, the Department and OCRF are implementing the SWAP and advancing its strategic goal of connecting Oregonians with the outdoors.
